Annual Report

Aims and Purposes

St Andrew's Parochial Church Council (PCC) has the responsibility of cooperating with the incumbent Revd Terry Brown (Terry), in promoting in the parish the whole mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical. It also has maintenance responsibilities for the Church building and Churchyard at The Green, Sandon.

Objectives and Activities

St Andrew's PCC has the responsibility of cooperating with an incumbent, when appointed, promoting in the parish the whole mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical. It also has maintenance responsibilities for the Church building and churchyard at The Green, Sandon. During the year, we continued with the following vision

"In the light of God's call, and our situation here, our vision is:-

- 1 "To glorify and worship God and to further his kingdom on earth.
- 2 "To declare and show the love of Christ for all people to the people of Sandon.
- 3 "To teach, encourage and help people to be disciples of Christ.
- 4 "To proclaim Christ's Gospel to the people of Sandon and the wider world.
- 5 "To encourage commitment and personal growth in Christian discipleship and spirituality.
- 6 "To channel God's love through service and care for all."

The PCC is committed to enabling as many people as possible to worship at our church and to become part of our parish community at St. Andrew's. Our services and worship put faith into practice through prayer and scripture, music and sacrament.

We try to enable ordinary people to live out their faith as part of our parish community through:

Worship and prayer; learning about the Gospel; and developing a knowledge and trust in Jesus.

Provision of pastoral care for people living in the parish.

Missionary and outreach work.

To facilitate this work we feel it is important that we maintain the fabric of the Church of St. Andrew's and regular maintenance is carried out, mainly by volunteers.

Achievements and Performance

Worship and Prayer

The PCC is keen to offer a range of services during the week and over the course of the year which our community find both beneficial and spiritually fulfilling.

This year we have continued to welcome growing numbers of families into our church to the family service on the 2nd Sunday morning each month at 10 am.

All are welcome to attend our regular services of sung Communion at 10 am on the other Sundays, as well as a said communion on Tuesday mornings at 9:30 am. At present there are 71 parishioners on the Church Electoral Roll, of whom 37 are not resident within the parish. Four names were added during the year and one was removed because he has moved away from the parish. The average weekly attendance is 40, though average numbers counted during October, were 75 as we celebrated several extra festivals at that time. Numbers increased for special services such as the Queen's 90th birthday celebration, harvest, Memorial service for loved ones, Patronal festival, Christingle and at Easter and Christmas times. On Easter Day 71 people attended and there were 46 communicants, while 422 attended special services during Advent and on Christmas Eve and Morning 89 people attended and 61 received communion.

As well as our regular services, we enable our community to celebrate and thank God at the milestones of life's journey. Through baptism we thank God for the gift of life, in marriage public vows are exchanged with God's blessing and through funeral services friends and family express their grief and give thanks for the life completed in this world and to commend the person into God's keeping. We have celebrated 10 Baptisms and six weddings and held two funerals in our church this year. In November we celebrated with four confirmation candidates at the Cathedral.

Deanery Synod

Two lay members of the PCC and the incumbent sit on the deanery synod. This provides the PCC with an important link between the parish and the wider structures of the church. This year the PCC continues to explore questions posed to parishes in the deanery about the most effective deployment of stipendiary and non-stipendiary clergy, and the development of lay leadership as Mission and Ministry units are set up. St Andrew's is now engaged with our 10 neighbouring churches in the formation of 'The Compass Churches'.

Use of the Church building and the St Andrew's Room

The church remains open every day from about 9 am to dusk and many neighbours and visitors come in for quiet prayer and reflection.

During the year work has been done to retille the nave and North Aisle to ensure the church is waterproof for the future. This has been done by contractors with the help

of a grant from the Listed Places of Worship Fund. We plan a Thanksgiving service at the end of April 2017.

Each Wednesday in term time the St Andrew's Room and church are used by our Tiny Tots mothers and toddlers group. Up to 20 children and their carers have been regular attendees and the group also organised a teddy bear's picnic and a summer party.

There is a Tea and Chat group every Tuesday morning with occasional quizzes or speakers. This group enjoyed a Christmas lunch in a local pub and also a trip to the Orthodox monastery. The St Andrew's room is also used by the local school, WI, churches together in Chelmsford, Community Choir, Parish Council and our church choir.

Pastoral Care

Some members of our parish are unable to attend church due to sickness or age. Terry visits at home and church members visit the local Nursing Home and offer lay communion to some of the residents and staff once each month. Terry is a governor at the local secondary school and visits to lead assembly and as chaplain. Church members visit those who unwell or not able to get to church and we are planning to set up a more formal group to take some of the load from Terry as he expands his role in other ways.

Mission and Evangelism

Helping those in need is a demonstration of our faith. The PCC has encouraged fund-raising and we have continued to support a pastor and an evangelist in Marsabit, Kenya for the last 5 years, giving £1920 each year as well as an extra donation of £1000 for a motorbike. We have also supported CHESS the local homeless support group and made small donations to other good causes.

We enjoyed a lunch in July at which the Dean of Chelmsford cathedral spoke to us about stewardship and we launched the Parish Giving Scheme in Sandon to which 10 people have now signed up.

We have enjoyed fundraising concerts by 'The People of the Green' and 'The Southend Boys and Girls' choirs. Our summer fete included a dog show and stalls in the churchyard and raised much needed funds while proceeds from the Christmas Fayre in the village hall also boosted our finances.

Our parish magazine is now distributed quarterly to all houses in the parish and to those on the Electoral Roll, and copies are available in church. The magazine keeps our parishioners informed of the important matters affecting our church and includes articles which help to develop our knowledge and trust in Jesus as well as some which are more light-hearted. The St Andrew's website is kept up to date and includes information about events and services, as well as previous magazines, pew sheets and photos of past events.

St Andrew's Youth Fellowship sadly held its last meeting on 31st March. Thank you to Evelyn Ellis and her team for their dedication. Many will have fond memories of Peter and Evelyn as they worked with the youngsters in the SAYF and the annual pantomimes.

Men's and Ladies breakfasts continue monthly at Butts Green Garden centre. Our annual outreach 'Tea on the Green' in August attracted a crowd of over 150 who sang with the Salvation Army Band and listened to a message from Caroline Brown and prayers.

Ecumenical Relationships

The church is a member of Churches Together in Chelmsford and The Chelmer Crouch Group. We have this year supported the local United Reformed Church (URC) at Howe Green by attending their Christmas Carols, Fair-trade coffee morning and a new venture of Cafe church on some Sunday afternoons. One member of the URC congregation has joined us for bible studies. Small groups have attended lay and clergy led courses: 'The Way', 'The Rhythm of Life' and 'The Good the Bad and the Ugly' especially encouraging as three of the four people confirmed recently have been coming along.

Volunteers

We thank all the volunteers who work so hard to make our church a lively and vibrant community: those who clean the church and arrange flowers, work in the churchyard, ring the bells, sing in the choir, make the tea, manage our website, edit and deliver our magazine and all those others who share their talents and time in so many different ways to make St Andrew's a loving community.

Structure, governance and management

The method of appointment of PCC members is set out in the Church Representation Rules. At St. St Andrew's the membership of the PCC consists of the incumbent (our Rector), 2 Churchwardens, and members elected by those members of the congregation who are on the electoral roll of the church. There are 2 deanery synod representatives and there are 9 elected members allowed with 3 elected each year for 3 years. All those who attend our services are encouraged to register on the Electoral Roll and stand for election to the PCC. The PCC members are responsible for making decisions on all matters of general concern and importance to the parish including deciding on how the funds of the PCC are to be spent. New members receive initial training into the workings of the PCC. The full PCC met six times during the year with an average level of attendance of 80%. Thank you to our electoral roll officer and our vulnerable adult and child safeguarding officers. Terry is at present 'Priest in Charge' of St Andrew's, Sandon but the PCC in negotiation with Bishop John and the Patron have agreed to remove the suspension of the living and celebrate the licensing of Terry as Rector on Tuesday 9th May 2017.

Financial Statement for the year ended 31st December 2016

Giving from all sources decreased in 2016 by £2,098 to £28,579 from £30,677 in 2015.

Income from Other Charitable Activities and other Trading Activities also fell by £2,262 compared to 2015. As a result, our total income fell by £8,491 to £46,379. Our outgoings decreased slightly by £586 to £41,834 giving us an excess of income over outgoings of £4,544, with last years' excess being £11,408.

As at 31 December 2016 we had total balance in the bank of £21,963 although some £4,427 of this total is restricted funds.

The Building Maintenance Fund had a balance of £7,984 at the end of December. The main expense items were:- Parish Share £26,250, Magazine £1,885, Insurance £1,714, Electricity £2,366, Water £77. Maintenance expenditure was £550.

Churchyard expenses totalled £678 although much voluntary work was carried out over the year for which we are very grateful. No grant was received from Sandon Parish Council during 2016 in respect of maintaining the churchyard.

In Mission a total of £3,803 was given to various causes.

Fund Raising expenses were £696.

We paid various affiliation fees and subscriptions totalling £175.

Miscellaneous expenses were £53.

Fabric Report for 2016

Church Roof retiling project

Following the repair requirements of the Quinquennial Report of 2013 page 13 para. 5.3 and further more recent inspections of the roof, we have pressed ahead to get finances to cover the retiling of the 4 main roofs of the Church. (Lady Chapel and Nave Roofs).

A Roof Committee was set up and our second bid to the Listed Places of Worship Fund (Lottery Fund backing) was successful to the tune of £61,900. In addition to this 'The Friends of Sandon, Church' contributed £6,900 and two further grants of £5,000 each from The Wolfson Foundation and via the National Churches Trust, plus PCC financial help, has enabled us to go ahead with the project at the end of 2016. The work is currently going on in early 2017 and should be complete by March 21st 2017.

The contract for the work was awarded to a local company, Caters Roofing, overseen by our Church Architect, David Ferguson. The total cost will be in the order of £76, 500. Caters have been very attentive to our needs for the use of the Church for weddings and funerals etc during the retiling period.

We sincerely thank our 'live wire' Anna Cosby who has led the considerably complicated bidding process to get where we are today. In addition we also thank all those on the Roof Committee and those also involved in raising money through 'The Friends' by buying tiles, and donating their time and energy to this project.

There will be a specific Thanksgiving Service for the project completion on Sunday the 30th April.

The Church's Interior

Cracks over the exit arch to the St. Andrew's Room have recently been beautifully repaired by Kim Davies. Also Andy Hilton's Building company have very skilfully repaired a large hole in the wall in the lower Chancel area and also cracks around a lofty window from where wasps had habitually emerged.

All of these repairs have been done Free of Charge and we thank Kim and Andy for this.

St Andrew's Room and Church Cleaning

Matthew Wood has cleaned and polished the SAR and Church regularly this year as part of his Duke of Edinburgh Awards Program.

Church Roof Gutter Cleaning This was done in early 2016.

Holy Dusters

This is a new group set up to keep the Church clean. Christine Mennie has managed to keep the group suitably well organised and supplied with refreshments etc. We are always seeking additional helpers.

Churchyard

Christine Mennie has again done an excellent job organising regular churchyard maintenance groups, usually on a Saturday morning. We were rewarded for this endeavour by winning third prize again at the RCCE (Rural Council for Community of Essex) competition- which covered the whole of Essex.

Churchyard Front Fence

The yew hedge now constitutes the front fence and is growing through those areas occupied previously by the old fence panelling (removed and burnt during 2016). A few other stretches of the fence have also been repaired throughout 2016.

Churchyard Trees

These have been regularly inspected and kept in check by Mike Harris for which many thanks.

Memorial Garden

The wooden surround posts had rotted and Mike Harris very kindly replaced them expertly during 2016. The writer had all the plaque names re-fettled and Denise Carter has kept the gardens looking attractive. Thank you Denise and Mike.

Grass Cutting

The PCC thank the Parish Council for cutting a significant part of the churchyard grass this year. Nick Mennie continues to cut a big area and the writer does the Memorial Garden area and environs. We particularly thank George for doing a great deal of hard work throughout the churchyard during the year. He is an enthusiastic colleague!

Lightning Conductor Testing

This was carried out this year and we now have a relevant certificate!

Fabric Purchases and Gifts during the Year

During the year we purchased a new white projector screen for £130 and a new lightweight 'Shark' vacuum cleaner for £150. Of greater significance however is that we were given three new chandeliers each bearing 9 candles by Sarah and Andrew Harding following their wedding in Church on the 28th of December. We are currently applying for a Faculty so that the chandeliers can remain in place. A Madonna figure was purchased to replace one that had disappeared some time ago. This was subject to a Faculty duly processed by Michael Puffett.

So, overall the Church fabric is now in a better condition than previously but there are plenty of other items which will need our attention very soon.

Deanery Synod Report

Deanery synod met 4 times in June at East Hanningfield, September at South Woodham Ferrers, November 2016 at Danbury and February 2017 at St Luke's, Moulsham.

Topics included:

Schools Youth Ministry (SYM) presentation and discussion about their work in mentoring youngsters in many local schools and provision of 'Refresh' a space for youngsters to offer prayer or take part in guided discussions.

'What are Deaneries for Now?' – this was a discussion led by Archdeacon Elizabeth Snowden around the purpose of Deaneries after the formation of mission and ministry units (MMUs).

A service of thanksgiving with Canon Ann Easter preaching about her work as one of the Royal chaplains.

Youth Work and youngsters in church – a discussion led by Mark Tiddy the youth advisor for Bradwell area.

Three MMUs are developing – South West Chelmsford Churches, The Great Baddow Team and Compass Churches of which Sandon is a part together with the rest of the Chelmer Crouch Group and Stock, West Hanningfield, South Hanningfield and Downham.

The Deanery Synod will continue after the formation of the MMUs to share best practice, arrange speakers of interest, share prayer and worship together as well as its legal and pastoral duties within the diocesan structure.

Chelmer Crouch Group and Compass Churches

Sandon have for many years been members of the Chelmer Crouch Group.

Following the launch of Bishop Stephen's paper for the diocese entitled, Transforming Presence in 2012, there has been a renewed conversation about the ways in which churches of the diocese work and collaborate together. This resulted in plans for a new set of groupings which are entitled Mission and Ministry Units, MMUs and parishes asked to form such groupings. Some have been and are working well notably the South West Chelmsford churches which contains Galleywood; Widford, St Mary's and Church of the Holy Spirit; and Moulsham also with 2 churches, St Luke's and St John's. The Chelmer Crouch Group, CCG, has formed the basis of the MMU of which Sandon is a part. But there have been changes. Recently the CCG consisted of the following parishes: Boreham, Little Baddow, Bicknacre and Woodham Ferrers, Danbury, East Hanningfield, Sandon and South Woodham Ferrers. At the start of the process Boreham decide to leave the CCG to join parishes in the north of Chelmsford. Stock and West Hanningfield have agreed to join with the CCG and more recently the churches around Downham have

decided to join this group. These are Downham, Ramsden Bellhouse, Ramsden Heath and South Hanningfield.

Attempts are being made to formulate and formalise a structure for this new grouping. It has a new name, Compass churches and for the time being it is being chaired by Revd Clive Ashley. It has 4 full time paid ministers, namely, Revd Clive Ashley, Revd Carol Ball and Revd Stephen Robertson. Revd Dr Stephen Need is paid but part time. Revd Jane Seymour is a paid curate but with significant responsibilities at Broomfield hospital and Revd Michèle Marshall and Revd Terry Brown are unpaid ministers.

The Compass Group needs to complete decisions about working in smaller groups because the parishes are predominantly rural they are larger distances apart, how it will be represented on its decision making body, how parishes will actually relate to each other and how it will apportion Parish Share which has been suggested in due course.

Churches Together in Chelmsford

Sandon have for many years been members of Churches Together in Chelmsford. About 50 churches in Chelmsford are members and its main activity is the Procession of Witness from 5 points to the City centre High Street for a service to mark Good Friday. Last year that was followed by a Passion Play in the High Street which although not organised by Churches Together in Chelmsford was supported by CTiC.

At its AGM last year it was agreed to change the name to Christians Together in Chelmsford, still CTiC. CTiC sponsored the performance of a moving play, Simeon's Watch, by the Riding Lights Theatre Company in November. Collectively the churches in Chelmsford support the work of CHESS, the Foodbank, Street Pastors, Renew Counselling, Work Place Chaplaincy, YMCA, Christian Aid and Interfaith Forum and Chelmsford 24-7 Prayer. Since Revd Canon Carol Smith took up a new post in Kent in January 2017, Revd Keith Jackson, senior pastor at Life Church in Chelmsford has been acting as Chair and Revd Ade Adayi has been acting Vice-Chair. All denominations are involved and it provides a vehicle where churches can share events across a wider forum. Its AGM is on Sunday 4th June at Skylark church at 3:00 pm followed by Tea and Displays and all are welcome to attend.
