



On April 9th, 2023, ACK St. Matthew Laisamis church was consecrated, with a great turnout of locals and Christians from neighboring parishes of Isiolo and Marsabit. Attendees included parishioners from Karare, Kamboe, Merile, Parkishon, Sagante, and St. Peter's Cathedral. Bishop Qampicha officiated the service, accompanied by top Diocesan leadership including Administrator Canon Mark Kargi and Marsabit Archdeacon Ven. Joseph Kesho Kidane. The event featured a range of performances including choir, dance, and songs.

The church was built through a partnership with Christ Church Mt. Pleasant, who have now helped construct six sanctuaries across the diocese. These churches include 1. Christ Church Elebor 2. Oasis of Grace Maikona 3. Church of the Good Shepherd Badasa 4. Christ Church Goro Rukesa 5. Christ Church Game 6. St. Mathew's Laisamis. We express our gratitude for the support from Christ Church Mt. Pleasant and look forward to further cooperation in the future.

HEAVY RAINFALL & FLOODING









The previously drought-stricken northern region of Kenya is currently experiencing unprecedented rainfall and flooding, leading to widespread devastation and loss of life. The sudden influx of water has caused the loss of ground cover and vegetation, further exacerbating the effects of the long drought. Rivers and streams have burst their banks, causing flash floods, landslides, and mudslides, which have swept away homes, livestock, and entire communities.

The flooding has also caused a breakdown in communication and infrastructure, making it difficult for emergency services and aid organizations to reach those in need. Many roads have become impassable, isolating entire villages and communities. Schools and other public facilities have been closed, disrupting daily life and exacerbating food insecurity issues.

As a result, there is an urgent need for support and assistance to affected communities. We are committed to providing relief efforts to those in need, including providing shelter, food, and medical assistance. We are working closely with local governments and other organizations to ensure that aid reaches those who are most vulnerable and in need.

Marsabit County Government has announced that a total of 821 families have been left homeless after heavy rains continue to fall in different parts of the state.

Victims are currently staying awake in the cold as their houses were destroyed, with several livestock perishing.

Releasing that news, the spokesman for the county government of Marsabit Barille Abduba has explained that the areas most affected by the floods are Konon Gosi, Dambala Fachana, Walda, Bori, Godoma, Nana, Anona among others.

10,018 goats and 173 camels have died in North Horr County.







COMMUNITIES IN DIFFERENT PARTS OF THE DIOCESE RECEIVE FOOD RATIONS DONATED BY THE DIOCESE THROUGH THE PARISHES

Reports from governmental and non governmental organizations on the ongoing drought paints a very dire situation across the County of Marsabit and many of its neighboring counties. A number of factors have contributed to this including erratic and little rainfall over the last years, deforestations, unsustainable use of limited resources by an growing population, insecurity and tribal fighting that has hindered food production and business ventures and factors beyond human control. The current drought affecting northern Kenya and its environs is probably the hardest one yet.

a great challenge posed by the ravaging drought is Food Security, local government reports estimate a sixty and above percentage loss of livestock which comprise around 80 of live hood for the residence, over 80 percentage of locals depend on livestock for their live hood in some way with only 2 percentage formal employment and 1 percent engaged informal employment and business, for the church this also affects congregations as some disperse, education is affected and its sets back many positive forward.

Its not all doom and gloom because there are efforts from the national government, NGOs and Religious Organization to tackle the drought. Aid in terms of food continues to raised and distributed within the most vulnerable communities to alleviate the situation. Our Decision is an active player in tackling the issue and we continue to periodically distribute food across the our diocese throught the parish priests and parish councils to our congregagation and futher to the communities. within which our churches reside
